

PE Sports Premium Funding Expenditure Percentage Breakdown 2025-26

For the academic year 2025-2026, Corsham Primary school received £21,680 as part of a government funded initiative. The PE and sports premium is given to schools to spend in order to achieve these key indicators:

Key indicator 1: Increased confidence, knowledge, and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.

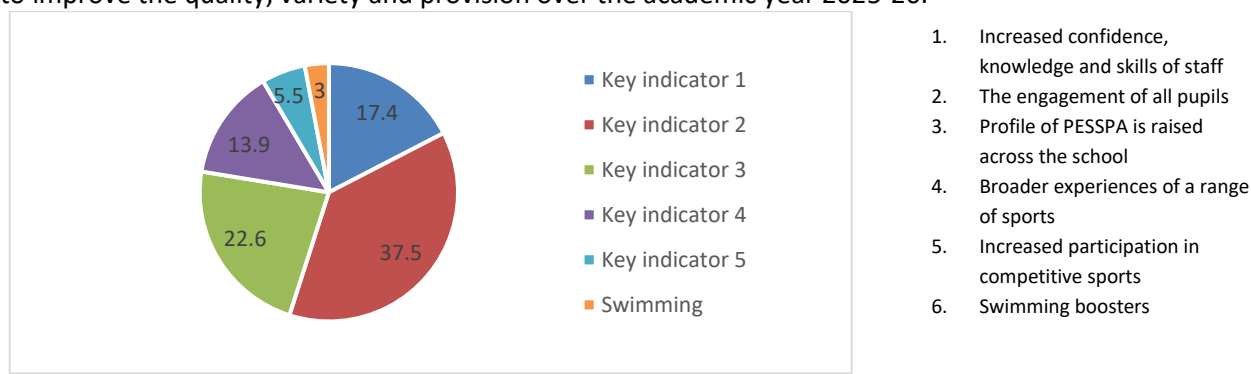
Key indicator 2: The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity

Key indicator 3: The profile of PESSPA (PE, School Sport and Physical Activity) being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement

Key indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils

Key indicator 5: Increased participation in competitive sport

Staff Training and Use of External Agencies

At the end of last academic year, staff were asked about their thoughts on the PE schemes we had been following. Results from the survey found that staff preferred following units from one scheme and so the decision was made to align the curriculum to one scheme. PE Hub subscription was purchased and all year groups' curriculum units were planned around this scheme. Feedback from this decision has been overwhelmingly positive and teachers have commented on how easy it is for them to ensure lessons are high quality, inclusive and progressive for all. We also secured training from Wiltshire Cricket who taught year groups and also ran a CPD session for all teaching staff. All teachers also gained at least 2 sessions of CPD through mentoring provided by In2Sport.

Resources and Equipment

Corsham Primary used part of the funding to replace and improve the resource available to improve the provision of PE. This included new benches for Pound Pill and new netball posts for Broadwood. Resources audits were carried out at both sites throughout the year and new resources were purchased to ensure the curriculum was able to be delivered with the correct equipment.

Increasing Participation, Variety and the amount of Competitive Sports

The employment of the SSCO allowed the children to attend sporting events that were competitive and non-competitive. These were mainly focusing on year 5 and 6 and many children represented the school in a range of sports but were also offered to Year 3 and 4s in the summer term. Sports days went ahead at Broadwood but were unfortunately cancelled due to very wet and then very hot weather at Pound Pill. The decision was made to complete the Sports Day events in class. Every child had the opportunity to participate.

We also provided the opportunity for those children that could not swim 25 metres in year 5 and 6 with booster sessions. Year 3 and 4 children also swam for two terms at Broadwood and Year 4 swam twice at Pound Pill.

Monitoring Impact

Lead Athletes were able to carry out a number of lesson observations across the year. We also enjoyed the experience of working for the AfPE Quality Mark award where we were able to showcase high quality PE sessions to the external examiner. We were successful in gaining the award.
