

PE Sports Premium Funding Expenditure Percentage Breakdown 2024-25

For the academic year 2024-2025, Corsham Primary school received £22,670 as part of a government funded initiative. The PE and sports premium is given to schools to spend in order to achieve these key indicators:

Key indicator 1: Increased confidence, knowledge, and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.

Key indicator 2: The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity

Key indicator 3: The profile of PESSPA (PE, School Sport and Physical Activity) being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement

Key indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils

Key indicator 5: Increased participation in competitive sport

Staff Training and Use of External Agencies

This year the teaching staff have used two schemes to deliver high quality Athlete sessions twice a week: Real Pe and PE Hub. Teachers in Years 1 - 6 also received training through Wiltshire Cricket. In2Sport also worked with groups of children to support with individual targets using physical activity as the focus of their interventions.

Resources and Equipment

Corsham Primary used part of the funding to replace and improve the resource available to improve the provision of PE.

The employment of the Forest School Practitioner enabled all areas of the curriculum to be accessed by all children across all schools throughout the year. These sessions promote OAA opportunities and being physically active and safe in the outdoors.

Increasing Participation, Variety and the amount of Competitive Sports

The employment of the SSCO enabled children across the school to take part in a wide range of sporting events, both competitive and non-competitive. While many of these opportunities were aimed at Years 5 and 6, pupils in Years 3 and 4 were also able to participate, particularly during the summer term. Sports Days took place at both sites and were designed so that every child had the chance to be actively involved.

We also provided additional swimming support for pupils in Years 5 and 6 who had not yet achieved the 25-metre standard, offering booster sessions to help build their confidence and skills in the water. In addition, all Year 3 and 4 pupils accessed swimming lessons for two terms, ensuring strong progression and water-safety awareness across the lower key stage.

Monitoring Impact, Stationery and Materials

The Lead Athletes carried out pupil conferencing this year, gathering children's views on what it means to be an athlete at Corsham Primary School. Their feedback has been valuable in shaping our understanding of pupil experience and will help guide future developments. Monitoring of PE lessons will become a key focus for the Lead Athletes next year to ensure consistency and high-quality provision across the school.

Lead Athletes also collected feedback from teachers regarding the effectiveness of the PE schemes currently in use. Following this review, it was agreed that from next year we will move to a single, consistent scheme — *PE Hub*. This decision reflects staff feedback and our aim to provide a coherent, progressive curriculum supported by high-quality resources and materials.
